

Peace Be with Us Brother Knights,

Lenten calling to New Evangelization to Meet Christ, Live Christ, and Share Christ

Brother Knights, the Holy Roman Catholic Church has sounded the

call to the New Evangelism on Monday, 14th of October 2013 with the "Address of Pope Francis to Participants in The Plenary of The Pontifical Council for Promoting the New Evangelization". This is an urgent call of the highest importance, given the dire urgency of the times. A tsunami of evil is overwhelming the whole world. The assault on faith, family and life is in full force.

As per: Matthew 24:12 "and because of the increase of evildoing, the love of many will grow cold." and in: Luke 18:8 "But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Brother Knights while things seem hopeless and we seem helpless in resisting and fighting the onslaught, there is always hope. When sin abounds, grace abounds even more as per Romans 5:20 Our Lord Jesus Christ has already won the victory so as we move forward to the end of time, we know how it will all end as Christ has nailed it all in the foot of the cross.

# THE PASCHAL TRIDUUM

Even though we have just begun Lent not that long ago, my next notes will be on the Paschal Triduum. The Triduum, derived from the Latin word meaning "three days," is a central and profound liturgical celebration in the Catholic Church that spans Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.

This sacred period serves as the culmination of the Lenten season and prepares the faithful for the celebration of Easter, commemorating the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. "Christ's Cross is a sign of the hope that does not disappoint; and it tells us that not even one tear, not one sigh is lost in God's plan." Pope Francis

Holy Thursday marks the beginning of the Triduum, focusing on the Last Supper of Jesus with his disciples. The liturgy of this day emphasizes the Institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood, highlighting the sacrificial nature of Jesus' impending death on the cross. The washing of the feet recalls Jesus' act of humility and service, emphasizing the call to discipleship and selfless love. The theology of Holy Thursday underscores the profound connection between the Eucharist and Christ's sacrifice, inviting us to participate in the Paschal Mystery through the reception of the Body and Blood of Christ. "In the Eucharist fragility is strength: the strength of the love that becomes small so as to be welcomed and not feared; the strength of the love that is broken and shared so as to nourish and give life; the strength of the love that is split apart so as to join us in unity." Pope Francis

Good Friday is a day of somber reflection on the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. The liturgy on this day centers around the Passion narrative, emphasizing the salvific significance of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. The veneration of the Cross, a central ritual during the Good Friday liturgy, invites us to contemplate the depth of God's love and the redemptive power of Christ's death. The theology of Good Friday emphasizes the transformative nature of suffering, inviting us to unite our own sufferings with Christ's, recognizing the redemptive value of embracing the cross in their lives. "Before the image of the crucified God, we will bring, in prayer, the many, the too many who are crucified in our time." Pope Francis

Holy Saturday is a day of silence and anticipation, representing the time between Christ's death and resurrection. The Easter Vigil, celebrated on Holy Saturday night, is the culmination of the Triduum. This liturgy begins in darkness, symbolizing the despair and hopelessness of a world without Christ. The lighting of the Easter fire and the Paschal candle signifies the light of Christ breaking through the darkness, dispelling sin and death. The liturgy of the Easter Vigil narrates salvation history, underscoring the resurrection as the fulfillment of God's promise. The theology of Holy Saturday invites us to trust in the victory of life over death, echoing the Easter proclamation, "Christ is risen!"

The Paschal Triduum is a rich tapestry that weaves together the foundational elements of our Catholic Christian faith. Holy Thursday emphasizes the Eucharist and the call to selfless love, Good Friday underscores the redemptive power of Christ's sacrifice on the cross, and Holy Saturday anticipates the joyous proclamation of the resurrection. The Triduum invites our participation to enter into the Paschal Mystery, embracing the transformative power of Christ's life, death, and resurrection. Through these sacred days, we are called to deepen our faith, reflect on the profound mysteries of salvation, and rejoice in the hope of Easter.
